have made arrangements for
receiving a constant supply
on the arrival of every Steamer.

As there is no pasture in
this immediate neighbourhood
it will become necessary for
Your Memorialists to remove them
to Langley, and bring them down here

as business requires,
Your Memorialists beg
most respectfully to state
that the "Journey dues," will
be a very heavy tax, on the
large business they intend to
establish, for the few miles
they intend ^{to carry} their Cattle, up
the Fraser. — They therefore
respectfully solicit, that Your
Honor, will grant permission
to Your Memorialists to transport
their Cattle as far as Langley
without the payment of
Journey dues.

As long as duty was collected on
articles coming from Victoria I arranged
with Mr Fry to mark receipts on which
duty had been paid or what, he was
able to ascertain, on the produce of the
Island. He wrote me always a
particular account of receipts of the
same steamer & by this means the
Revenue as far as possible is protected.
It was impossible for me to take the
importance of the shippers own statements.
In this case it is impossible for Mr
Fry now to find out anything about the
outs and as the amount is very small
& the duty on certain food is now
relinquished altogether I think it is scarcely
worth while to do anything in the matter
and allow the money -
