the light house immediately as
a watchless man as a light keeper
as this is the 6 time within 5
months he has broken the orders of
the light house & I wish for this to
be done immediately and let
me get a light keeper that I can
depend upon.

In obedience to your Letter dated the 25.
of January - In reference to John
Harran denigrating the truth of my
Report. I Beg to inform you that when
I make a Report to I make one that can
be relied upon. And in my Second
Report upon this Subject to you.
the only way I can give you have
that my Report to you dated the 10 day
of January is Credit. is to give you
the dates of his absent with out Leave
and when I do so I wish you to
understand that when I give you
the dates I date from after your last
orders. As I bland and wrote to you
that John Harran was absent 27 days
in the place of 9 day. with out leave.

These are the dates that J. Harran
was absent with out leave from me on the 13 and 14
of December and on the 3 of January
until the 10 day of January - And my
Reason for reporting him absent on
the 15 of January December. is this
on the 11 the First Assistant Keeper
came to me and reported to me that
John Harran refused to do duty.
I then went to his room and saw
him and he told me that he would
not do duty and did not the same
night. I made a report of this at the
time to send to you dated the 15 of
December. but the next morning
J Harran came and Beg of me that

To report him as he would resign I then
with know my report to you and as I hope
you will look on this case but only as been about
with out leave but as disobedience of orders.
and my reason for reporting absent with out
leave on the 13 of December is this. he asked
for leave to go to Tygumann which I refused
to give and referred him to your last orders
but he insisted upon going and left the
Rock and told me that he would take all
responsibility upon him self. So I think
this should be looked upon as disobedience
of orders. And when I report him absent with
out leave on the 3 of January until the 10 of
January on the 2nd of January he asked for leave
to go to Tygumann. And promised to return
on the 3. which I refused to give at the time
but after he bothered me for some time I
asked him how he was to get back and he
told me that he would get a boat to bring
him back on the 3 - After this I told him
that he may go but at the same time
I told him if he did not return on the
3 that he would take all responsibility upon
him self and he did not return on
till the 10 day of January - I also wish
you to know that I had but trust to
John Harmon as a light keeper after the
17 day of November last but I do not wish
to hear any further reports as I did but
at the time but believe he during the truth
of my report it does not surprise me as I know
know he is a naked character at one thing
of the port and with respect to it I hope
you will add it till he returns to the light
house or Brass tablet which he is to be.

To Lang to the government. I have bound
him for the last 2 months to return but
as he has not done up to this time.

be a better light than the one now
in use and quite safe -

I take the liberty to inform you that the boat now at the Race Rock light-house is too large for ordinary purposes as it can not be launch easily at high tides and can not be taken in easily at low tides. And when launch'd it would take five men to man it in moderate weather. A boat of smaller dimension would be more suitable so that two men could launch it at any stage of water when required. A small 16 foot boat with moderate oars would be more suitable for the Race Rock light-house. if a boat can be supplied it would not cost more than 100 dollars complete and it would be of great service at the light-house.

I also beg to inform you that I inquired from the boatman who is a carpenter how much he would make good ladders for and deliver them at the light-house and he tells me that he would make them for 10 dollars and deliver them at the light-house. I hope you will please have the cascade without delay as I am very much in need of ladders and this is my second time of applying for them.
