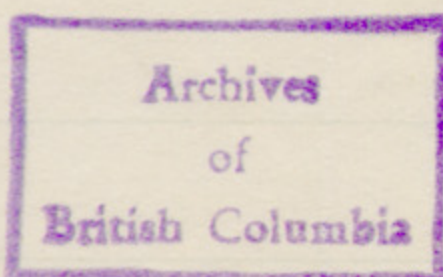

Stuart's Lake 15 Feby 1895

Dear McDonald.

Yours of the 3<sup>d</sup> received on the 13<sup>th</sup>. I saw the Rev<sup>d</sup> Father yesterday and he has told me he will take on any package for you. He leaves tomorrow so I will send on the Bolt of Flannel, Belts, & taken from Denis as his pack was too heavy & bulky. You ask<sup>d</sup> for 1 doz Perfumery wh screw tops in the requisition I received on the 4 Inst. and I thought as well to supply then 3 doz of what I had. In your letter now before you you ask for 2 doz again. And as one of the Indians told me you had no perfumery I send now 1 doz Jockey Perfumery. You may have another doz of this kind if you wish. I send you the last bottle of lavender water in the shop.

I have given Babine Or. for \$153<sup>12</sup> the amt rec<sup>d</sup> with your letter, and will have a P. O. O. sent to the Sister Superior of St Mary's Academy, Wm. when the packet next reaches Queenell in March.

The Gunlocks are not worth returning I have knocked off the chq of \$100

The prices of from Victoria this outfit are 57<sup>34</sup> for <sup>#</sup>T-B Tobacco and \$134<sup>14</sup> tin Coal Oil. There were a lot of overchgs from Victoria this year but I got a credit Invoice which straightened things up.

I enclose <sup>acct.</sup> balance of chips from this  
place against Babine.

We are having lots of snow, and it  
has been rather cold for the last week or  
so but it has changed to snow this last night.

The Indians doing no trapping around  
here just now and I fear a falling off in the  
monthly receipts. I fear they will loose some  
of their cattle too for want of fodder. I  
have plenty and will sell a little to those who  
can pay me.

Poor old Mack still feels the loss of his  
old woman. I have got him living in the  
house with us. He is looking very old now.

He says he will write to you by this  
chance.

Wishing you good luck &c.
