many places which are now barely passable
for waggons, while the general breadth of
the road throughout its entire length, with
the exception of those places where it runs
over level ground, approximates much nearer
to 10 or 12 than its original 18 feet.
Unless immediate steps are taken for its

repair, I fear that it will be very
late in the Spring before it can be
put into working order. The weather
here is now very mild, with daily heavy
rains & the Indians affirm that the winter
is virtually over. I enclose herewith
you on this subject.
